Infant mortality rate of 6.8 per 1000 live births

Infant mortality rate for the Bradford District increased from **6.4 per 1,000 live births in 2019-21** to 6.8 in 2020- 2022

Gap between Bradford and England is

2.9 deaths per 1,000 live births

- Bradford has the joint lowest life expectancy rates for males and the second lowest life expectancy rates for females in West Yorkshire.
- Females in Bradford have lower healthy-life expectancies than regional and national averages.




